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10. 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INTELLIGENCE

a. The enemy situation on 01 March 1966 was as follows:

There are two (2) Local Force Companies, the C-117 Armed Unit and the C-116 Armed Unit (Huong Thuy), estimated strength 80 and 65 men respectively, operating in the TAOR. Enemy activity within the TAOR consisted of perimeter harassment by small enemy units during the hours of darkness, laying of mines, limited attacks on outlying Marine units, assassination, VC propaganda and political campaigns, intelligence gathering, and infiltration of VC units through the TAOR to reach the rice areas and other areas of operation.

Enemy units now operate near our TAOR:

(1) 910th Main Force Battalion, estimated strength 200-300 men, equipped with 2 x 100 mm mortars, 10 RPG, B-40 (RPG) anti-tank weapon, located vicinity of PHUONG DUC (ID 9698).

(2) Elements of the 902nd Main Force Battalion, estimated strength 100-200 men equipped with mortars and machine guns (cal unknown), located on PHUONG THU peninsula (ID 9218).

(3) C-16 Armed Unit (Local Force), estimated strength 80 men is located vicinity YD 545015.

(4) One SAPPER squad, estimated strength 3-10 men, operating out of the northern PHUOC District. Equipment unknown. Amount and type of demolitions unknown.

(5) Elements of the Intelligence Battalion, Thua Thien, operating out of the PHUOC area. Strength and weapons unknown.

(6) Unknown number of local guerrillas, operating in conjunction with VC Main Force and Local Force units.

b. The enemy initiated the following incidents during the period:

(1) 1-3 March. See Operation NEW YORK After Action Report. Submitted (last month) . . 1 . . at .

(2) 042118H. CAC-7 patrol received approximately 200 rounds of small arms and automatic weapons fire from across the river from vicinity of YD 838196. Patrol returned fire. VC casualties unknown.

(3) 051315H. CAC-2 received 6-8 rounds of small arms fire from an estimated 7 VC vicinity YD 94164. CAC-2 returned the fire and physically pursued the VC. The VC withdrew across the river in sampans. CAC-2 maintained small arms fire at the VC until they were across the river. Three (3) VC were seen to drop and to be dragged away.

(4) 072040H. CAC-5 spotted an unknown number of VC moving north toward friendly positions. CAC-3 opened fire with small arms and pursued. One VC KIA (body), 2 VC KIA (possible). One automatic weapon with 3 magazines and 3 VC grenades were captured.

ENCLOSURE (1)

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(5) 072110H. CAG-5 observed 2 VC approaching ambush position (YD 818180). CAG-5 opened fire with small arms fire; VC returned the fire, broke contact and fled. One VC WIA. Swept area and made a house search with negative results.

(6) 081235H. CAG-2 spotted a 3 man VC patrol vicinity YD 914165. VC fired small arms from across the river; CAG-2 returned fire resulting in 1 VC WIA (possible) who was dragged away by the remaining 2 VC. VC were carrying 2 carbines and one rifle (type unknown).

(7) 081330H. Received small arms and automatic weapons fire vicinity YD 790069. No hits on aircraft.

(8) 100900H. AD received automatic weapons fire from vicinity YD 7811. Artillery mission was called in; assessment of mission was one machine gun destroyed.

(9) 110730H. Recon patrol received sniper fire from vicinity YD 913064. Artillery mission was called in; could not observe results.

(10) 125000H. Unknown number of VC probed CAG-2 OP (YD 910149). CP personnel fired small arms and M-79 rounds. 1 VC WIA (possible). Searched area with negative results.

(11) 162235H. CAG-5 heard movement to the left of ambush site (estimated to be 20 people) vicinity YD 921109. VC fired approximately 100 rounds of semi-automatic and automatic weapons fire at the ambush position. Fire was returned with 500 rounds and the area was swept with negative results.

(12) 21-23 March. 3rd Battalion, 4th Marines assumed operational and reporting responsibility of the TAOR. See After Action Report for Operation ORION, enclosure (7).

(13) 231235H. CAG-5 and PF's discovered two anti-train mines on the railroad tracks vicinity YD 929077. Mines consisted of 25 pounds CHICOM TNT each, 5 flashlight batteries and homemade firing mechanism. EOD dispatched to area to disarm mines.

(14) 242000H. Golf Company personnel saw eight (8) people vicinity YD 911132. When fired upon, people hit the deck. People started moving when firing stopped. Golf Company machine gunner opened fire, pinning them down in the rice paddy. A patrol was dispatched to search area. Negative results.

(15) 242100H. CAG-5 reported one VC sniper vicinity YD 912118 using a carbine. Negative results.

(16) 242300H. Unknown number of VC probed CAG-3 position (YD 912119) firing from the vicinity of the railroad tracks. Negative results.

(17) 252235H. CAG-1 sighted one (1) man running down a trail vicinity YD 899176. Fired 2 rounds of small arms fire with negative results.

(18) 262200H. CAG-2 OP vicinity YD 912148 received one incoming hand grenade. The spoon was heard to fly. Grenade exploded went off

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the OP ~~Received~~ heard of small arms fire in the direction the spoon was heard. Negative results.

(2) 1500ZCE. Half Company patrol, while in their ambush site (YD 900134) received one (1) hand grenade and several rounds of small arms fire from an unknown number of VC. Small arms fire and grenades were returned. VC broke contact. No fatalities unknown.

(3) 2000ZCE. CAC-3 roadblock reported approximately five (5) VC firing small arms in their position (YD 912117). Roadblock returned fire and VC broke contact, moved to the northeast. At 2100ZCE, FF's stationed on the bridge (YD 912117) fired small arms fire. CAC-3 sent one team to support the FF's. Small arms fire and M-79 rounds were fired until the VC broke contact. A search of the area was made with negative results.

(4) 2700ZCE. Approximately one (1) VC squad ambushed CAC-7 patrol vicinity YD 822009. VC opened up with automatic weapons, followed by six (6) explosive charges that had been previously set in along the trail. Patrol returned fire, going into immediate action drill. Friendly casualties: 4 USMC WIA, 3 USMC KIA, 1 USN KIA, and 1 PF WIA. VC casualties: 1 VC KIA (body), 6 VC KIA (in scrub). A search of the ambush area was made on the morning of the 28th. 1 VC (WIA) was found hiding in the brush. One K-53 and 1 USO qualified was captured.

(5) 1500ZCE. One (1) element of the (1) COB along trail vicinity YD 816177. After firing small arms a search of the area was made. Neg contact.

(6) 0000ZCE. Co-B Company 111 received one round of small arms fire vicinity YD 902141. No friendly casualties.

- (2) With the approach of the rice harvest, the enemy has increased unit movement through the TAOR and into the hamlets to obtain the rice.

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b. Significant events.

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(1) Sequential listing of all contacts, general description of scheme of maneuver and results attained.

(a) 1 March - There were 5 squad size patrols conducted with 8 ambushes and 21 listening posts employed.

(b) 2 March - There were 7 squad size patrols conducted with 13 ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(c) 3 March - Operation NEW YORK terminated. (See enclosure (4) to Command Chronology for period 1-28 February 1966). There were 6 squad size patrols conducted with 19 ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(d) 4 March - At 2203H CAC-7 received automatic fire from 8 VC at YD 838196. CAC-7 returned fire and swept area, VC broke contact and fled. Contact results: 1 Marine WIA and 1 civilian WIA. VC casualties unknown. There were 18 squad size patrols conducted with 19 ambushes and 22 listening posts employed.

(e) 5 March - There were 22 squad size patrols conducted with 20 ambushes and 21 listening posts employed.

(f) 6 March - At 1315H CAC-2 sighted 7 VC at YD 914164. VC opened fire with approximately 6-8 small arms rounds. CAC-2 returned fire and physically pursued the VC. The VC immediately withdrew across the river. CAC-2 observed 3 VC drop as if hit and they were dragged away by other VC. Contact Results: 3 VC WIA (unconfirmed). There were 23 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 22 ambushes and 22 listening posts employed.

(g) 7 March - At 1440H Recon sighted 4 VC moving south in camouflaged boat at YD 799074. Recon took VC under fire and adjusted artillery fire on boat with good effect on target. Contact Results: 4 VC KIA. VC casualties unknown. At 2110H CAG-5 ambushed 2 VC at YD 818186 wounding 1 VC. A sweep of the area was conducted with negative results. Contact Results: 1 VC WIA. At 2240H CAC-3 made contact with an unknown number of VC at YD 905099. CAC-3 opened fire and immediately assaulted. VC broke contact and fled north. Contact results: 1 VC KIA, 1 automatic weapon, 3 magazines and 3 ChiCom grenades captured. There were 24 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 22 ambushes and 21 listening posts employed.

(h) 8 March - At 1235H CAC-2 received approximately 30 small arms rounds from 3 VC at YD 914165. Fire was returned and CAC-2 observed 1 VC fall and being dragged away. Physical pursuit was not made because VC were across river. Contact Results: 1 VC WIA (unconfirmed).

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At 2010H a patrol from CAC-3 made contact with 3 VC at YD 908109. CAC-3 opened fire and assaulted with negative results. There were 19 squad size patrols conducted with 18 ambushes and 21 listening posts employed.

(i) 9 March - At 0820H the Aerial Observer received heavy small arms and automatic weapons fire from YD 789111 to 790097. Artillery fire miss. Misses were adjusted on target and air strikes conducted. Aerial Observer reported spotting many charred spots which appeared to be VC KIA. The napalm striker turned off foliage revealing a tunnel system from YD 788150 to 11 754144. Aerial Observer reported possibility of many VC KIA's resulting from burning napalm consuming the oxygen in the tunnel. There were 13 squad size patrols conducted with 22 ambushes and 22 listening posts employed.

(j) 10 March - Operation GIA LE commenced. See enclosures (2) and (3). At 0050H CAC-2 reported a grenade was thrown into their C.P. area from unknown direction. A sweep of the village was conducted with negative results. There were no casualties. At 0844H the Aerial Observer reported receiving automatic fire from vic YD 780110. An artillery mission was adjusted and the Aerial Observer reported a machine gun emplacement manned by 3 VC was destroyed. Contact Results: 3 VC KIA (unconfirmed). At 2320H CAC-2 was fired upon by 3 VC while deployed in ambush site. CAC-2 returned fire and conducted sweep of the area with negative results. There were 17 squad size patrols conducted with 7 ambushes and 23 listening posts employed.

(k) 11 March - At 1545H Recon reported receiving 1 round of sniper fire from vic YD 9130. Fire mission was adjusted at these coordinates. Sweep of the area was conducted with negative results. Contact Results: 1 Marine WIA. There were 19 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 14 ambushes and 22 listening post employed.

(l) 12 March - Operation LOC SON commenced. See enclosures (4) and (5). At 0100H CAC-2 reported a booby trapped WP grenade was sprung by unknown number of VC at YD 910149. A sweep of the area was conducted with negative results. There were 23 squad size patrols conducted with 10 ambushes and 22 listening posts employed.

(m) 13 March - At 2030H CAC-2 sighted unknown number of VC who appeared to be trying to infiltrate their position at YD 910149. VC were taken under fire and CAC-2 conducted a sweep of the area. Contact Results: 1 VC WIA (unconfirmed). At 2320H a squad size patrol from H&S Company received approximately 20 rounds of automatic weapons fire from estimated 5 to 10 VC at YD 846127. H&S patrol returned fire and assaulted the VC. The VC immediately broke contact and fled west. Contact Results: negative. There were 24 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 13 ambushes and 18 listening posts employed.

(n) 14 March - There were 22 squad size patrols conducted with 14 ambushes and 21 listening posts employed.

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(o) 15 March - There were 23 squad size and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 12 ambushes and 22 listening posts employed.

(p) 16 March - At 2020H Company G sighted 4 to 5 VC attempting to approach their lines at YD 895135. VC were taken under fire and they fled with no returning fire. A squad was dispatched to search the area with negative results. At 2230H CAG-5 estimated 20 to 30 VC were moving 10 to 30 meters to the left of their ambush site at YD 921109. VC opened fire with RPG's and small arms. CAG-5 returned fire and made a sweep of the area with negative results. Upon returning to their ambush site, CAG-5 fired an artillery fire missile at the fleeing VC with unknown results. There were 30 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 12 ambushes and 23 listening posts employed.

(q) 17 March - At 1420H CAG-8 apprehended 1 VCS at YD 823189. VCS was turned over to CIT for disposition. There were 24 squad and 2 platoon patrols conducted with 10 ambushees and 19 listening posts employed.

(r) 18 March - There were 31 squad and 1 platoon patrols conducted with 17 ambushees and 11 listening posts employed.

(s) 19 March - At 1000H a squad from Company H apprehended a 32 year old VCS at YD 889145. The Vietnamese male was apparently a buffalo boy but the place of apprehension was approximately 300 meters from the cattle and the subject appeared to be observing the counter-mortar radar area and the defensive positions in the area. When subject was approached by the squad he fled towards his cattle. VCS was delivered to CIT for disposition. At 1027H CAG-3 apprehended a 16 year old VCS at YD 796193. Subject did not have an ID card and the PT's accompanying the patrol stated they believed the subject to be a VC. The VCS was delivered to CIT for disposition. At 1142H CAG-8 apprehended a 45 year old VCS at YD 827196. VCS did not have ID Card. VCS was delivered to CIT for disposition. At 1545H Company H apprehended a 56 year old VUS near the vicinity of their tactical wire. He was moving around with no apparent purpose. VUS was delivered to CIT for disposition. There were 31 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 15 ambushees and 12 listening posts employed.

(t) 20 March - There were 20 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 10 ambushees and 11 listening posts employed.

(u) 21 March - This unit was committed to Operation OREGON. See enclosures (6) and (7). Control of 2/1 TAOR was assumed by 3/4 from 210800H until 240800H March 1966.

(v) 24 March - At 1438Z CAG-9 located 2 VC mines on railroad tracks at YD 938077 that was reported by the local PF's. EOD team recovered the mines which were primed for electrical detonation. At 2120H the 3rd platoon, Company E observed 3 VC near their defensive wire. A hand grenade was thrown at VC and he fled north into village. At 2147H a patrol from 3rd platoon, Company H observed 12 VC armed with semi-automatic and automatic weapons and 1 mortar via YD 901152. VC

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were taken under fire and pursued with the VC fleeing north. Contact Results: negative. There were 19 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 25 ambushes and 14 listening posts employed.

(x) 25 March - At 2215H CAC-1 sighted 1 VC running down trail at YD 999176. Two rounds were fired at fleeing VC with negative results. There were 28 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 20 ambushes and 13 listening post's employed.

At 2200H CAC-2 received 1 incoming grenade at YD 910149. CAC-2 swept area with negative results. There were no casualties. At 2230H a patrol from Company G employed in ambush site at YD 900134 received 1 incoming grenade and several small arms rounds. Fire was returned and VC broke contact. Contact Results: Friendly casualties were 6 WIA's (all slightly wounded). Enemy casualties are unknown. There were 30 squad and 1 platoon size patrols conducted with 24 ambushes and 3 listening posts employed.

(z) 27 March - At 2045H CAC-7 made contact with approximately 2 VC squad set in ambush at YD 912193. The VG opened fire with automatic weapons and explosive charges. CAC-7 employed counter-ambush tactics. Contact Results: Friendly casualties were 5 KIA's and 4 WIA's. Known enemy casualties were 1 KIA and 1 VCC (WIA), and an estimated 8 additional KIA's. At 2215H CAC-1 sighted 1 VC running down trail at YD 899176. Two rounds were fired at VC with negative results. There were 27 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 26 ambushes and 5 listening posts employed.

(aa) 28 March - At 1500H a patrol from Company G apprehended 1 VCS at YD 903133. Suspect had no ID Card and was delivered to GIT for disposition. There were 29 squad and 2 platoon patrols conducted with 29 ambushes and 5 listening posts employed.

(bb) 29 March - At 2245H CAC-5 opened fire from their ambush site at YD 915177 at 1 VC. VC fled and CAC-5 searched area with negative results. It was disclosed by a local civilian that the VC had attempted to obtain food. There were 29 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 29 ambushes and 14 listening posts employed.

(cc) 30 March - There were 26 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 25 ambushes and 14 listening posts employed.

(dd) 31 March - At 1010H a squad security patrol reported 22 rounds of sniper fire at a 6x6 truck at YD 908121. Patrol swept area with negative results. At 1950H Company J received 1 sniper round from left flank of perimeter. Location of the sniper could not be determined. There were no casualties. At 2107H CAC-7 apprehended 1 VCS female at coordinates 815176. Villagers had previously reported the location of the VCS to CAC-7 and stated woman was a VC. VCS was delivered to GIT for disposition. There were 27 squad and 2 platoon size patrols conducted with 26 ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

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LOGISTICS

a. Supply. Supply functions were abnormal in that Task Group Hotel, Task Group Foxtrot and organizations of the 4th Marines have been supported from this command's organic resources. This was necessary due to the arrival of personnel at Phu Bai prior to the arrival of logistical support for them. Some much needed individual equipment was received but not in sufficient quantities.

b. Maintenance. Maintenance functions performed by FLSU # 2 have been satisfactory. 194 Tactical Equipment Repair Orders were processed during the month.

c. Food Service. Food service personnel and facilities have been overtaxed due to the great influx of people and the limited facilities available.

d. Cantonment and Camp Facilities Development. Cantonment project DAG 1110-102 has been discontinued. Future cantonment and camp facilities development will be provided by higher Headquarters.

e. Transportation and Roads. Roads in the enclave have been maintained in a satisfactory condition. No transportation difficulties nor delays were encountered.

f. Fiscal. No deviations have been noted in the fiscal trend.

g. Water. The supply of potable water has been adequate. One well has been dug but is not in operation.

h. Motor Transportation. Preventive Maintenance checks and inspections continued and the results of the Commanding General's inspection were satisfactory.

i. Embarkation. This organization has participated in no embarkation or debarkation during the period. Materials for construction of mount-out boxes have not been available.

j. Hospitalization and Evacuation. Continued satisfactory support has been provided by Collecting and Clearing Company A. The Battalion Aid Station treated a total of 1405 patients during the month.

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

2. Dates of Operation. 100200H to 111350H March 1966.

3. Location. BIA THIEN Province, HUONG THUY District (Sub Sector). (See Operation Overlay (Enclosure (1))).

4. Control and Command Headquarters. Capt J.M. NOLAN, Commanding Officer Company H (Rein), 2nd Battalion (Rein), 1st Marines (Rein). Capt TANG, HUONG THUY District Chief.

7. Intelligence. See enclosure (1) for the enemy unit disposition, strength, and identification. The availability of weapons, materiel, food, and ammunition and the morale of the VC could not be determined due to the lack of contact during the operation. Cover and concealment generally was from poor to fair except in the populated areas, where hedge-rows, houses, and scattered tree lines offered good cover and concealment. Critical areas in the operating area consisted of the LOI NONG canal to the north and hills (YD 808106). The sky was overcast with a drizzling rain during most of the period.

a. Enemy forces.

(1) Composition, Strength and Combat Efficiency.



2. MISSION

2nd Battalion (Rein), 1st Marines (Rein) commencing at H-Hour on D-Day provide one rifle company (Rein) for blocking and patrolling of the village of LOC SON (See Operation Overlay). Be prepared to provide additional support as required.

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

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

1. SITUATION

a. Enemy forces

(1) Composition and strength

- (a) Size unknown, estimated to be two Main Force companies to one Main Force Battalion, possibly the 800th Main Force Battalion which has a strength of 400 to 600 men.

(2) Disposition

- (a) The enemy is strongly entrenched in prepared defensive positions concentrated in GS YD 5543 and YD 5345.

- (b) Positions are strongly built bunkers with houses built over them.

(3) Arms and Armament

- (a) 81mm, 82mm, and 60mm mortars (number unknown), 50 Cal. machine guns, and an unknown number of machine guns and automatic weapons.

- (b) Electrically detonated directional mines are suspected of having been employed.

(4) Reinforcements

- (a) The enemy has the potential reinforcement capability of up to three (3) Main Force Battalions.



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

All missions fired were for concentration data as part of the F.O.'s fire planning. Fire delivered by both batteries was sufficient and accurate.

b. Air. Air support was requested for the initial phase of the helicopter landing over the Tactical Air Request Net. Air support was provided by UH-1E's and close air support aircraft from 1st MAW. Med Evacs were requested from company level to Task Group Foxtrot by FM Med-Evac Net, which was specifically activated for Operation OMEON. Med-Evacs were expeditiously carried out. In future operations where distance from the operations area to the medical facility is a factor, recommend placing two helicopters in a nearby secure area for the purpose of Med-Evac.

7. Intelligence. For the intelligence estimate prior to the operation see enclosure (1). The operation was unopposed except for five rounds of sniper fire. The VC had been in the area in battalion strength. In the battalion objective area many fresh fighting holes and filled in machine pits were found. Villagers reported the village of CHANH LAC GC (VN 532456) to have been a VC battalion headquarters, which had been evacuated at about 201700H March 1966. The area of operation was characterized by huge rice paddies. Avenues of approach into the populated wooded islands in the middle of these paddies were confined to dikes and to 15 ft to 20 ft main access paths. Observation and fields of fire were excellent and unobstructed for the most part from those populated areas. Cover almost was good in the populated areas as the bamboo was thick and tall, the rice plants were heavily laden and thick. Cover was confined to dikes in the paddies and to the buildings, dikes, and canals in the populated areas. The dense bamboo, deep canals and deep marshes were the only real obstacles in the area of operation. The populated areas were the key terrain features. The weather, except for short periods of cloudiness was sunny, hot and humid with unlimited visibility. The local population was not hostile and in some cases volunteered valuable information. A total of 9 VCS were detained for further screening.

11. Results.

a. Personnel Summary, Enemy.

(1) Enemy. KIA-0, WIA-0, MIA-0, killed by air-0, killed by artillery-0, captured-0. VCS captured (arrested)-9.

(2) Enemy equipment and material losses. None.

b. Personnel Summary, Friendly.

(1) Friendly. KIA-0, WIA-0, MIA-0, killed by air-0, killed by artillery-0, captured-0, Mad Three - 11.

(2) Friendly equipment and material losses. None.

c. Only 1 air strike was conducted during Operation OREGON in the 2/1 TAOR. In this instance the ground forces searched the area.

12. Administrative Matters. See enclosures (1) and (2).

a. Adequacy of administrative plans:

(1) Supply. All resupply was by helicopter. Supplies were ordered in the A.M. with 11 and 12 being designated after determination of tactical situation and unit locations. Recupply was satisfactory with delivery of all requested items except for BB-451.

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(2) Maintenance. The only maintenance required was for communications-electronics items which were evacuated to the LSA for repairs.

(3) Treatment of casualties, evacuation and hospitalization. There were no casualties except for non-battle casualties. They were evacuated by helicopter to Company A, 3rd Medical Battalion for diagnosis and treatment.

(4) Transportation. 22 UH-34D's and 3 H-37's were used for transporting troops and equipment to the objective areas. There were 18 UH-34D's and 3 UH-37's used for returning to HUE-PAU BnL.

(5) Communications.

(a) The close proximity of Task Group Foxtrot Command post to that of this command permitted reliable external communications. It was found that the single side band net could have been replaced with another FM Net. This would have given a more reliable means of communications without the heavier and more difficult to logistically support AN/PRC-47.

(b) Internal communications within the battalion was excellent with the use of the AN/PRC-25 down to the company level.

(c) Resupply of batteries for communications equipment was not consistent during this operation. Below is a listing as to what was ordered and what was actually received.

(6) Medical evaluation. Ten Vietnamese patients were treated for minor illnesses.

13. Special Equipment and Techniques.

a. Mine detectors were taken and used but discovered no mines or other ordnance items in the area of operation.

b. Mighty Mite blowers were taken but were not utilized due to lack of targets.

14. Commander's analysis.

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It was evident that the VC forces had withdrawn under cover of darkness prior to the commitment of the Battalion into the area. In this connection, inclement weather coupled with availability of helicopters has a deleterious effect on our capability to fix the enemy once he is found. Weather will continue to be a prime factor in this area but it would appear that maximum commitment of available troops (to include RVN forces) should be made at the earliest once the enemy is located regardless of the means available.

1. Purpose. To publish the Standing Operation Procedure for the Battalion Operation Center.

2. General.

a. The direction and control of the tactical operations of this battalion will be accomplished primarily through the Battalion Operations Center. At the direction of the Battalion Commander, a forward command post may be established and control will shift accordingly.

b. The Operation Center Duty Officer (OCDO) will supervise the operation of the Battalion Operation Center and will insure that assigned personnel are properly instructed in their duties as part of the operation watch.

c. The Operations Center watch is responsible for the exercise of troop control and supporting arms operations which are considered routine in a combat zone. During periods of unusual activity the watch will be augmented by other personnel as assigned by the S-3.

3. Organization of the Watch. The 24 hour watch will be divided into four, two hour duty periods between 0800-1600 each day and four, four hour duty periods between 1600-0800 each day. The watch will consist of the following personnel:

a. Operation Center Duty Officer (OCDO).

b. S-3 Journal Clerk.

c. FSCC Duty Officer.

(1) Artillery TAC Net Operators.

(2) Air Net Operations.

d. Radio supervisor and Bettelica TAC Net Operators.

e. Foxtrot (Combined Action Company) Net Operator.

f. Other nets and personnel as required.

4. Duties of the Operations Center Personnel are as follows:

a. Operations Center Duty Officer (OCDO).

(1) Brief and pass on to the relieving duty officer all information which may influence the tactical situation during his watch.

(2) Upon assuming the duty as Operations Center Duty Officer, inventory and account for all classified material and information passed on by the old duty officer.

(3) Organize the watch section and insure that all personnel are prepared for and capable of carrying out their respective duties. Discrepancies will be reported immediately to the S-3.

(4) Supervise the operation and maintenance of all records, equipment and other material within the Operations Center.

(5) Be familiar with the operations and activities initiated by the battalions or other units within or adjacent to the TAOR, to the 1st ARVN Division Headquarters (TRC, HQ) and such other headquarters in the chain of command.

(6) Report any enemy or friendly activities which may affect ARVN or other Vietnamese units, in or adjacent to the TAOR, to the 1st ARVN Division Headquarters (TRC, HQ) and such other headquarters in the chain of command.

(7) Insure that patrol overlays are posted on the Sit Map showing patrol routes, initial points, check points and ambush sites. These will be labeled with time of departure, time of return and unit designation of patrol. After posting the overlays they will be marked POSSED and filed in the rear of the Patrol Overlay Folder.

(8) Make sure that the Training Syllabus for DONG DA Training Center is posted showing all night training which might affect the activities of Marine Units. A copy of the training schedule will be posted on the Operation Center bulletin board and all ARVN night training will be posted on the Sit Maps.

(9) Receive reports from units concerning enemy or friendly activity. Route such information to appropriate personnel and insure that both report and reply are logged into the S-3 Journal. Be familiar with reference (a) and require appropriate reports from subordinate units.

(10) All enemy sighting and/or contacts or other significant events will initially be reported to S-3, Executive Officer, and Commanding Officer. A Spot Report will be submitted to higher headquarters. (See Enclosure (1)).

(11) Coordinate with FSCC to insure maximum troop safety criteria are met and maximum effective use is being made of fire support arms.

(12) In the event of an attack upon this perimeter notify the Commanding Officer immediately and upon his order, sound the alert in accordance with Enclosure (2). Upon sounding the alert, insure that all units have responded, and advise the watch until the Commanding Officer and Staff Sections assume control over the situation.

(13) Be prepared to brief the Commanding Officer, Executive Officer, S-3 and official visitors upon their entrance into the Operations Center.

(1) Maintain an accurate chronological journal of all activities reported to the OCO.

(2) Receive and log all incoming and outgoing messages from the radio supervisor and OCDO.

(3) Insure that the patrol log is maintained showing time of departure, time at each check point and time of return.

(4) Assist OCDO to insure that patrol overlays are plotted properly on the Sit Map and filed after plotting.

(5) Insure that the relieving journal clerk is fully briefed on information which he must be aware of to effectively carry out his responsibilities.

(6) Maintain the Operation Center Bulletin Board to insure that all information is current and in order.

c. FSCC Duty Officer.

(1) Coordinate the fires of all supporting arms of the battalion including 81mm mortars.

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(2) Advise the Operations Center Duty Officer on all matters pertaining to the coordination and employment of supporting arms, including the elimination of unnecessary duplication of fires, that maximum troop safety criteria are met, and that maximum effective use is being made of fire support.

(3) Supervise the maintenance of the Artillery Sit Map and Artillery Support Guidelines.

(4) Insure that requests are logged, filed and delivered and that reports pertaining to supporting areas are properly prepared. (SITREP), Command Morale, After Action Reports).

(5) Insure that all fires outside the DMZ and the Free Fire Zone are coordinated with and approved by the 12th ARVN Artillery and such other higher headquarters.

(6) Record all fire missions for all supporting arms.

(7) Maintain an Intelligence target list to include:

(a) Target descriptions.

(b) Date intelligence was received.

(8) Recommend establish, and utilize fire coordination measures when required, such as:

(a) No fire lines.

(b) Bomb lines.

(c) Fire coordination lines.

(d) Restrictive fire plans.

(9) Daily artillery requirements:

(a) Inform OCDO of battery displacements, OP location, and impact areas.

(b) Plan daylight H&I's by 1100, and night time H&I's by 1630, and plot them on the Artillery Sit Map.

(c) Plot all patrols fire support requests and send on-call concentrations to higher headquarters FSCC.

(10) Daily 82mm mortar requirements:

(a) Inform OCDO of 82mm mortar platoon displacements, OP locations, and impact areas.

(b) Insure night time H&I's have been planned, checked, and plotted on the Artillery Sit Map by 1800 daily.

(11) Daily Air Requirement - FSCC Watch Officer will in the absence of the Air Liaison Officer:

- (a) Schedule daily resupply runs,
- (b) Arrange emergency Med-Evac.
- (c) Arrange for troop lifts as requested.
- (d) Post all scheduled flights on the Air Bulletin Board.

d. Radio Supervisor.

(1) Insure that all outgoing and incoming messages are routed to the S-3 Journal Clerk.

(2) Receive only those outgoing messages which are in written form and released by the OCEO before sending. The exception to this will be requests for unit positions or situations.

(3) Supervise conduct and operation of all battalion and regimental nets and advise the OCEO on the availability and capabilities of those nets.

1. Purpose. To establish requirements and to set forth procedures for the submission of combat reports.

2. Background.

a. The submission of timely and accurate reports of events occurring within the Battalion TAOR, is necessary for the planning, analysis and execution of operations and as a means of informing higher headquarters of the battalion's activities.

b. Paragraph (a) defines reportable incidents, charges subordinate and/or attached battalions and companies with the responsibility of reporting such incidents to higher headquarters and promulgates sample forms as found here-in.

3. Action. The following Combat Reports will be submitted to S-3 by organic and attached units:

a. Routine reports. Routine reports will be submitted as follows:

(1) Units on the defense perimeter and combat outposts will report hourly between the hours of 1800 and 0700 via land line or radio net.

(2) Units on patrol or involved in operations will report via land line or radio nets:

(a) Upon departing initial point.

(b) Upon arrival at check points, harbor site and ambush positions.

(c) Hourly.

(d) Upon return to OP.

(B) Routine reports will include any items of interest not requiring immediate attention or action, or a report of "No Cheng" will be submitted.

b. Initial reports of incidents.

(1) Significant events requiring the SPOT Report will be reported immediately using SALUTE (see Enclosure 1) via any communication means available.

(2) These reports should be brief but as thorough as the situation permits.

(3) Changes during a moving situation should be reported as they occur.

c. SPOT Reports.

(1) SPOT Reports (Enclosure 2) will be submitted as soon as possible after the event. Significant events include, but are not limited to, the following:

(a) Friendly casualties regardless of cause.

(b) VC initiated acts against friendly forces or installations.

(c) Capture of VC, VCS, weapons, equipment or documents.

(d) Discovery of arms, supply caches, medical facilities, and tunnel complexes.

(e) Death, injury, or mistreatment of non-combatants in the course of tactical operations.

(f) Significant damage to Vietnamese property by Americans.

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(g) Any incidents likely to result in immediate wide spread news coverage, or which could be detrimental to US/RVN relations (reference (b)).

(h) Enemy casualties.

(2) Reports will be submitted by the most expeditious means available and should follow the format in Enclosure (2). Items not reasonably certain or confirmed should be identified as "Reported", "Confirmed", or "Suspected". Sketches and/or overlays accompanying written reports should include information as shown in Enclosure (4).

e. Serious incidents reports.

(1) Reports will be delivered to this Headquarters, immediately upon discovery, of any incident which may arouse indignation against American personnel or be detrimental to US/RVN relations.

(2) Initial reports will be made immediately via any communications means available, using SPOT Reports and will be followed by a written report utilizing the format illustrated in Enclosure (5).

(3) Reportable incidents are as follows:

(a) Death, injury or mistreatment of non-combatants in the course of tactical operations.

(b) Significant damage to Vietnamese property brought about by action of Americans.

(c) Involvement with Vietnamese military or civilian personnel in a criminal incident or one of immediate or potentially serious significance from a political, military, or public relations stand point.

e. Fleam Reports. Fleam Reports will be submitted upon contact with enemy forces of platoon size or larger, incoming artillery or mortar fire, and air or armored attacks. Formats in Enclosures (1), (2) or (3) may be used as appropriate.

f. After Action Reports.

(1) Detailed After Action Reports will be submitted in writing to S-3 within 48 hours after any action in which an enemy force of platoon size or larger is encountered, or upon completion of company size operations.

(2); A narrative report will be submitted giving the details of the engagement/operation following the format as illustrated in Enclosure (3).
